May Talk: Two Notable City Landmarks Examined

he Isham-Terry House and the Butler-McCook House are two homes with fine Hartford pedigrees. At this year's Annual Court and Dinner, Jana Colacino, from Connecticut Landmarks, will discuss the history and importance of these Hartford properties. Her program will be a slide show about the significance of these Hartford landmarks, the very interesting people who lived in them, and their rich connections to the Founders of Hartford.

The Court and Dinner will be Tuesday, May 7, at the Town and County Club. Cocktail hour begins at 6:00 p.m. at the club, 22 Woodland St., Hartford. Dinner will be at 7:15, with Ms. Colacino's talk to follow.

Ms. Colacino is Connecticut Landmarks' Hartford Educator and Site Administrator for the Butler-McCook House and Garden and the Isham-Terry House. She joined Connecticut Landmarks in 2015 and oversees educational and public programming at the Hartford properties. She spearheads education for all ages, including K-12 school programs and internship programs for college students, and she oversaw CTL's participation in the inaugural year of Trinity College's Public Humanities Collaborative.

Since 2016, Jana has led Connecticut Landmarks' Youth Employment Program (YEP), a cornerstone mission of the

organization. This gives Hartfordarea high school students from urban and underserved populations an opportunity to learn about their hometown's rich history and create a sense of pride-of-place.

The program introduces students to the nonprofit world through hands-on projects; to Hartford's and Connecticut's cultural resources through field trips and research; and to the career world through work experience and by talking with a variety of professional guest speakers.

A number of YEP interns remain active with Connecticut Landmarks after the summer program by helping with events including Butler-McCook's Sunset Sounds Concert Series and the Hale Homestead Corn Maze. YEP alumni are also employed as site interpreters at the Butler-McCook House and Garden.

Jana is also an adjunct faculty member in the Department of Art and Art History at Eastern Connecticut State University, teaching courses on American Art, Visual Culture, and Women in the Visual Arts. She holds a B.A. in Fine Arts from the University of Notre Dame, an M.A. in Art History from Syracuse University, and she has completed doctoral work at Indiana University in American Art with minors in African Art and American Studies.

New Map Shows Hartford in 1640
