Our May Talk: New Techniques, New Discoveries

he speaker at the 2016 Court and Dinner of the Society of the Descendants of the Founders of Hartford will be Beth Caruso, a scholar and the author of One of Windsor: The Untold Story of America's First Witch Hanging.

Her topic, however, will not be witches *per* se, but the modern mapping techniques she used to do research for the book.

By combining old land records and modern mapping techniques, ancient mysteries can be solved, or at least better understood. Ms. Caruso will explain the process in her illustrated talk.

Her discussion will be sure to be of interest to those interested in better ways to do important genealogical research.

To research the book, Ms. Caruso used mapping techniques to help uncover the story of Alice Young, who was hanged on May 26, 1647.

The dinner will be held on Tuesday, May 10, at the Town and County Club in Hartford. Cocktails are at 6:00, the dinner is at 6:45, and a brief business meeting and the talk will follow.

Where Are The Founders Buried?

Part Two

The story of the first caretaker of the Ancient Burying Ground is instructive not only in its founding, but also in the history of the migration out of Hartford. Thomas Woodford, a founder (and my ninth great-grandfather) was "Appointed to act as sexton, March 3, 1640, to attend the making of graves of an corpses deceased; to receive for giving notice by ringing the bell, making the grave, and keeping of in seemly repair." Woodford moved to Northampton about 1658, and died there March 6, 1667.

When attempting to find the gravesite of a founder, one must take into consideration the growth of Hartford as well as the migration of Hartford founders up and down the Connecticut River. My father's early ancestors moved to Fairfield County, and I have found gravesites of these ancestors in Stratford and Fairfield. One was the site of Nathan Gold, not a Hartford founder, but nevertheless active in early Hartford as the Deputy Governor under John Winthrop, Jr.

One of the great joys of genealogy is finding the remains of an ancestor. If you are looking for your ancestors' remains, you may have to study the history of your founder's time and be prepared for some field trips outside of Hartford. Studying the history can itself be a great joy, and you will come away with a deeper understanding of the widespread and wonderful accomplishments of those who went before you.
